Christmas Zoom Recital



The Christmas Zoom recital was a lot of fun. I think all students enjoyed being able to sit back and watch themselves on the big (or little!) screen, surrounded by family.

The Christmas Recital is an opportunity for students to display their amazing skills and also to inspire or be inspired by older and younger pianists. I always have requests from students after the Recital to learn pieces that they heard at the concert.

Bench height

Playing the piano is a physical activity that requires good seating posture. While I have always had an adjustable bench, I have found that it doesn't adjust easily enough to accommodate the various heights of students, so I was thrilled to install my new hydraulic bench for students and a foot rest for younger students allowing me to adapt the bench to each individual's height with ease.

During zoom times I've been able to see posture of students in the home. Sadly, piano stools are sold for

adults and don't take into account the 5 plus years children may be using a seat before they get to the 'standard' adult height. Being at the correct height enables freer playing and actually makes it easier to play piano. Notice the beautiful looking hand movements that a concert pianist makes – a lot is to do with the arm/hand position and is dependent on the



height of the seat. See the pictures, and check is your child are they sitting at the correct height at home. If your bench is adjustable, please do adjust it to their height. It it isn't, please add a cushion to bring them to the correct height.

Recorded exams

It's that time of year when the culmination of the hard work over the year gets presented in exam form. Good luck to students who are entering RIAM, LCM and Trinity College London exams for the summer session. This is the second year of recorded exams. Trinity will continue to offer a recorded exam in the future alongside their usual in-person exams while the other boards will revert to traditional formats once things have settled down.



For the past years I have been entering students into 3 different exam boards as each has it's own particular style of exam.

One of the advantages of RIAM (Royal Irish Academy of Music) is that the exam centre is easy to reach in the beautiful building at Westland Row beside Pearse Street Station. However, the exam is one day in the year! Advantages of LCM (London College of Music) & Trinity College London is the huge range of pieces to choose from each year.

Whilst RIAM offers 6 pieces (choose 3) LCM offers approximately 17 pieces and Trinity a choice of 21 pieces to select from. It is so important that students enjoy the pieces they will be working on over a year which is why I have branched out to other exam boards. If you are interested in exploring other boards do let me know.
